

Bonfire Night (*amended, please ignore previous due to error*)

*****Remember remember the 5th of November!*****

We're asking everyone in our community to also remember the laws and safety procedures around fireworks and bonfires to ensure everyone has an exciting and pleasant time.

Police officers will be conducting patrols around and on the night, they will look to remind people of the legislation first and foremost, but will look to enforce if they see people knowingly breaking the law.

Please keep in mind:

- For most days of the year, it is illegal to set off fireworks between 11pm and 7am,
- **On the 5th November only**, the curfew will be extended to midnight, giving you an extra hour to enjoy the night.
- ▶ Please bear in mind that for displays shortly before or after the 5th November, the usual legislation still applies, this includes the Friday and Saturday prior to bonfire night this Sunday.
- lt is illegal for under 18s to purchase any fireworks and shop staff must do their due diligence in challenging those who look under 21.
- Under 18s are also not legally allowed to possess **adult** fireworks in a public places, items such as sparklers do not count as adult fireworks.
- It is ideal to inform neighbours in advance if you will be letting off fireworks at home, particularly for those who are elderly or vulnerable, or have pets or infants. If you live near horses or other animals kept outdoors, it is best to approach the owners to let them know.

Dear All

A good month! As noted last time, a big effort was going to be required to properly clear the blocked and overgrown watercourse all the way from CSt Giles to Water Hall on the outskirts of C St Peter. We are delighted to report "mission accomplished", after three tough work parties, There is now unimpeded through flow for the first time since operations were disrupted by lockdown. More: further efforts in Old Amersham have almost completed the reach from the church through to "Ambers" Mill by Station Road. Also, a squad of Chiltern Society volunteers has made a start at Bottom House Farm and, hopefully, will continue in November.

Meanwhile, Affinity Water have completed two improvement projects in Amersham <u>at Barn</u>

<u>Meadow and Pondwick Meadow</u> and we have added two more Invertebrate monitoring sites that should confirm quality benefits. While progress is slow and there is much competition for funds

across the region, we continue to press for commitments within the next Water Asset Management Programme - AMP8: 2025 - 2030 beyond the already "guaranteed" modest reduction in abstraction at Amersham in 2024. Recent activities have included an excellent webinar hosted by Thames Water on short and long term plans for achieving substantial ecological benefits while ensuring water supply through the next 50 years. Also, with Chiltern Society, Chiltern Chalk Streams Project and Colne Catchment Network, an initial "meeting about a meeting" to put some more bones on various ideas on the theme of "Mending the Misbourne".

By the way, slides from the ColneCAN conference mentioned last month can be seen here and give some idea as to how recent work on the Chess catchment may be viewed as a pilot for other subcatchments of the Colne - itself a catchment within the Thames region. If nothing else, they indicate how much work is being done by many people on various initiatives to cherish our rivers. And as another aside, I commend Affinity Water's SOS (Save Our Streams) initiative to you.

Chalfont St Peter Parish Council has taken possession of the site for the new Nature Reserve on the banks of the Misbourne and preparatory work will commence shortly.

We have two loose ends to complete to be in good shape for the continuing winter recharge of the aquifer and, hopefully, resumption of flow through CSt Peter before too long. In Old Amersham, we will aim to complete the last 60 metres behind the Tesco Carpark next Wednesday 1st November afternoon. And we will clear the second half of the section from Mill Lane to Chalfont St Giles on Saturday 4th November morning. Please let me know if you can help us with either or both.

We will have our final informal "not a meeting" for the year - i.e. a drink and a chat about any of the above or other - on Wednesday 15th November from 7.15 at The Greyhound - all very welcome, whether old hands or newly on board.

And, perhaps most importantly of all, a reminder that our 16th Annual Dinner is on Wednesday 13th December - as usual an informal, I hope fun, and not especially fluvial evening for all. I'm really looking forward to hearing by 15th November that you (and partner/friend) can join us.







Project Groundwater is a partnership project, funded by Defra as part of the £150 million Flood and Coastal Resilience Innovation Programme which is managed by the Environment Agency to develop and test new approaches to resilience tailored to local communities. We aim to transform how communities prepare and respond to groundwater flooding. To ensure that Project Groundwater delivers the best possible service to the communities affected by groundwater flooding, community engagement is at the heart of our project.

We are working on a new flood alerts system, and we are keen to gather feedback through a survey and focus groups.

Walking in the footsteps of an Edwardian – Fiona Brewer and Paul Graham

Stephen Springall was an Edwardian born in nearby Iver Village and a passionate advocate for Rights of Way. His 1907 walk book 'Country Rambles Round Uxbridge' explored the local landscape such as Denham, The Chalfonts, Harmondsworth, Rickmansworth as well as Hedgerley. Many of his walks traversed the countryside and riverbanks of what is now known as the Colne Valley Regional Park. Learn more about the man and how through the changing landscape his walk book was brought into the 21st Century.

Fiona Brewer has worked for the charity, Groundwork South, for 10 years. During her time with the charity she has worked on a variety of projects for the Colne Valley Regional Park such as exploring responsible forage, discovering the Park's industrial heritage, organising the Colne Valley Park Festival as well as working with Paul Graham to produce the walk book – 'Walking in the Footsteps of an Edwardian' based on Springall's book 'Country Rambles Round Uxbridge.'

Paul Graham has lived in Iver since 1980 and has been involved in helping preserve and encourage access to the countryside ever since. He joined the managing board of the Colne Valley Regional Park in 2012 and finds the time for practical outdoor work as well. Local History is another enthusiasm.




